

French - Year 6 – Homes and houses (&Elf on the shelf) – Autumn 2

Prior Learning: Children have learnt about masculine and plural nouns and talked about how they are feeling.

A typical French house...

Houses in France tend to NOT be made of wood (though it does exist) and instead have concrete or stone walls, especially old houses. So what do houses look like in France? Tile floors are popular and so is parquet. Windows are vertical and open from top to bottom. Instead of unlocking a window horizontally and sliding it up, generally French windows open more like a door with two vertical parts and unlock with a handle.



4. TWAL: I can say and write a sequence of sentences to tell a story

In this lesson read a spooky house story and the write our own story using a model. We will be trying to listen attentively and make links with English.



1. TWAL: I can understand and say some nouns for rooms in the house.

We will learn the names of rooms in the house. We will also learn about the determiner before the word. We will be trying to listen attentively and make educated guesses.



'on' in French is a sound that comes from the nose.

5. TWAL: I can understand new nouns and use them to play a game

We are going to learn some names of items and rooms that you might find in a castle. We are then going to try and remember them when playing a board game.

2. TWAL: I can pronounce some objects for the house

We will be pronouncing the names for objects for the house. We will try to identify 'ly' and silent letters.



When consonants are at the end of words they are **often** silent.



6. TWAL: I can use prepositions to say where things are

We will learn how to say prepositions when describing where the Elf on the Shelf is.



3. TWAL: I can use adjectives to describe rooms in the house

In this lesson we will be using adjectives correctly with masculine and feminine nouns to describe rooms.
