PSHE Year 1 (Spring 1) Digital Literacy and Communication

Prior Learning: In Year R children will have learnt about how to use the laptops/ipads- logging on and off. Awareness of strangers online. Keeping personal information private.

We cover how information is stored and used, how to assess and access the reliability of information and to be able to protect ourselves on line by understanding the influences of extreme views within the 'Digital Literacy and Communication' theme of our PSHE Education.

This includes learning about accessing places safely online, searching online confidently and safely, understanding what our private personal information is and how others can use it unkindly, being able to create work online, how to send an email and understanding that not all information online is true.

1. TWAL: How to access online sites/places safely

We will be learning that children can go to exciting places online, but they need to follow certain rules to remain safe. — Assessment opportunity before and after lesson

2. TWAL: How to use ABC searching

We will learn how to search for pictures online by clicking on letters of the alphabet. They learn that directory sites with alphabetical listings offer one way to find things on the Internet.

* A web search engine is like a search engine in that it helps users find ...information on the Web by searching the Internet for them.

 Alphabetical order is a way to sort (organize) a list. It helps a reader to find a name or a title in the list. It is done by following the standard (usual) order of letters in an alphabet



3. TWAL: To keep things private online

We will learn that many websites ask for information that is private and discuss how to responsibly handle such requests. Pupils create their own 'Shop Window' - What information would you like to be available about you in a safe shop window? What information wouldn't they include and why? Try developing a digital shop window of the class - you could use a safe online space such as Photo2Fun (on iOs and Android) or Photo Talk, or learning platform or secure online area for the shop window display. Use digital images, sounds and video.
