PSHE Year 6 (Spring 1) Digital Literacy and Communication

Prior Learning: In Year 5 children will have learnt how to use ICT safely and effectively. We will be revisiting passwords and looking closely at how we can create secure passwords, we will be creating a digital citizens pledge, knowing how to deal with spam and looking at how we can and do use ICT to support and enhance our learning.

We cover how information is stored and used, how to assess and access the reliability of information and to be able to protect ourselves on line by understanding the influences of extreme views within the 'Digital Literacy and Communication' theme of our PSHE Education.

This includes learning about Online Relationships, talking safely online and being a super digital citizen, making privacy rules and strategies for handling cyber bullying and revisiting and reflecting on images in the media which do not necessarily reflect reality.

1. TWAL: How to develop safe, rewarding online friendships

We will learn that the Internet is a great place to develop rewarding relationships. We will also learn not to reveal private information to a person they know only online. Further lesson idea: 'How to talk safely online' Select appropriate tools to enable the creation of a child friendly multimedia advert or presentation based on key persuasive points about how to talk safely online. Year 6 to present to year 5.
