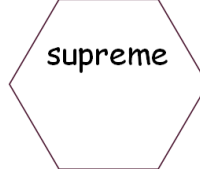


R.E. Year 3 Summer 2

Words we will know!




1. Communicate: What are your ideas about God?

TWAL: to communicate our own ideas about God.

We will describe in simple terms our own response to the idea of God.

5. Evaluate: Are Christian ideas about God important?
TWAL: to evaluate the importance of God for Christians.


We will describe the importance of God to Christians.

 Christians believe that their God is the eternal, Supreme Being who created and preserves all.

4. Contextualise: What do Christians think about God?

TWAL: to contextualise God in the Christian faith.

We will look at a range of Christian hymns/songs and Bible passages which describe God.

 These show that Christians believe their God is omniscient (all-knowing), omnipotent (all-powerful), and omnibenevolent (supremely good).

2. Apply: When might you or other people think about God?

TWAL: to apply our ideas about God to others.

We will identify some simple examples of how ideas about God relate to our lives and the lives of others.

Theme: Ideas about God – Christian and Jewish


Concept: God

Christians and Jewish people share the belief that God created the world in 6 days, but have different stories that describe what their God is like.

5. Evaluate: Are Jewish ideas about God important?

TWAL: to evaluate the importance of God for Jewish people.

We will describe the importance of God to Jewish people.

 Jewish people believe there is one God who created the universe and every Jewish person has a personal relationship with.


3. Inquire: Who or what is God?

TWAL: to inquire about the concept of God.

We will create a job description for what we think the qualities are that a God needs.

4. Contextualise: What do Jewish people think about God?
TWAL: to contextualise God in the Jewish faith.

We will read the story of the burning bush, and the story of the crossing of the red sea from the Torah to find out about the Jewish God.

 These stories show that the Jewish God rewards good deeds while also punishing evil.
