

Concept: Good and Evil

Most Hindu people celebrate Diwali (also written Diwali) which is the festival of light. Most Hindus dress in brightly coloured clothes, decorate their houses in bright colours and light candles.



2. Contextualise

We will describe ways in which Hindus remember good and evil in the story and celebrations of Diwali.



The evil Ravana kidnapped Sita and Rama rescued her and brought her back to the city. Hindu's celebrate Rama, who is good, defeating Ravana, who is evil.
