Dear Parents/Carers and pupils

It has been a busy half term with lots of fantastic learning taking place! Mr Candy and I have had a great first term getting to know the pupils, staff and our community, and what a pleasure it has been for us both. The pupils have settled into their new classes well and have been working very hard. Below are some particular highlights of the term so far...

**Nursery and Reception** have been lucky enough to have a visit from Greg Bottrill - early years 'guru' and author of 'Can I Go and Play Now?' Greg spent the day with our early years' pupils and then staff received training from Greg on Drawing Club, an approach that immerses children into the world of story, enriches language skills and develops fine motor skills. **Year R** have had a fantastic first few weeks at school. They have been exploring their classrooms & garden, and learning to play and learn with lots of new friends! They have been enjoying learning with their favourite things, like dinosaurs, superheroes and pirates! The children have enjoyed music lessons with Mrs Thompsett and even joined their very first assembly to celebrate Harvest. They have also been enjoying learning about the numbers 2, 3 and 4 and how to make these numbers in different ways!



**In Year 1**, they have been looking at moving picture books and learning how to make their own. The classes have enjoyed reading Cave Baby by Julia Donaldson. This has inspired the children to create mammoths using different materials, produce mud paintings and to design their own cave paintings.



**Year 2** had a great trip to Royal Victoria Country Park where they were greeted by Florence Nightingale. They learnt lots of facts about Florence Nightingale and how she changed nursing and hospitals. In class the children have been comparing famous nurses in their History lessons and have been discussing how the nurses changed the way hospitals look after patients.





This week in Year 2, the children have created artwork based on the pop art created by the famous artist Andy Warhol. They really enjoyed using polystyrene to make their prints and then they used paint to make a pattern using our designs.



**Year 3** has had a wonderful first half term! They have been doing some fantastic learning across the curriculum. In particular, the children have really enjoyed our learning about the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age. We were very fortunate to have a fantastic history workshop, which immersed the children into what life was like in the Stone Age.

**In Year 4**, they have been looking at Indian Art. They looked at different variations of Indian artwork. We particularly enjoyed creating Rangoli patterns used for Diwali to welcome Goddess Lakshimi.



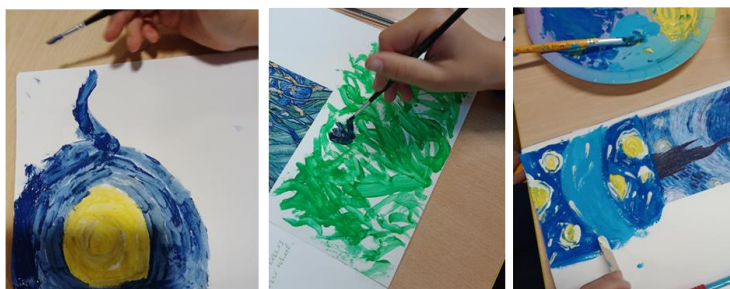
**Year 5** have been writing stories based upon the novel *Wolf Brother* by Michelle Paver. Mrs Crump has put forward Isabella's work to be celebrated in our Newsletter. Mrs Crump said: This is a lovely piece of work from Isabella which describes the setting of our story. What makes this a beautiful piece of writing is that Isabella included so much detail that it makes the reader feel like you are there. She has also used powerful verbs and adjectives, which makes her writing stand out.

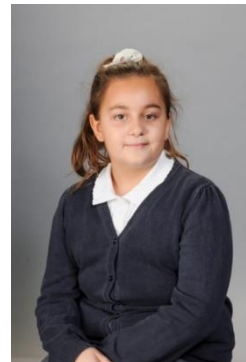


### Special mention:

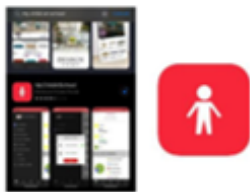
### Top Tips for getting the most out of reading at home:

1. If you can find the time beforehand, read the read-aloud book to yourself first, so you can think about how you're going to read it to your child.
2. Make reading aloud feel like a treat. Make it a special quiet time and cuddle up so you can both see the book.
3. Show curiosity about what you're going to read: *'This book looks interesting. It's about an angry child. I wonder how angry he gets...'*
4. Read through the whole story the first time without stopping too much. Let the story weave its own magic!
5. Read with enjoyment. If you're not enjoying it, your child won't.

### **MCAS SUPPORT**

MCAS is an app that all parents need to download from the Play Store (Android) or App store (Apple). You need to type in the search bar – My Child At School - the app looks like this:

1. Download the My Child At School app.
